Resolutions for submission to the R.A. in April were formulated and have now been approved by the PWTA and other NYSUT locals so will go forth. They are largely "motherhood and apple pie." and include Resolutions (summarized here) to oppose any recommendations that would result in reduction of Social Security and Medicare benefits: urge NYSUT and its affiliates to support lifting the cap on all contributions to FICA or Social Security: oppose attempts to diminish benefits of the 2010 Health Reform Act: (n.h. see article elsewhere on some of its benefits) support efforts to include Single Payer Universal Health Coverage for all: work for a retirement plan to grant to new retirees a plan similar to that afforded Tier IV members (n.h.; a Tier V has already been passed, and there is talk of a Tier VD; work to strengthen public relations programs to counteract negative publicity about teachers and teacher unions. Apropos of the last resolve: you are, I am sure, aware that being a retired teacher these days is far preferable to still being in the classroom in light of all that is going on

started a national reform group called Students First. Our President, our Secretary of Education, our NYS Governor-Elect are all impressed with these "reforms". Secretary Arnie Duncan had imposed similar changes in the city of Chicago when that was his domain; Chicago, it is true, had many educationally problematic areas - and from what I understand from current residents, still does! Teachers know that for many reasons evaluation methods that are being imposed (in NY as elsewhere) will lead to similar and MORE problems: parents will request the "A+" teachers: teachers of students who need and get the most help may surely find their test scores cannot rise as do those of students with fewer problems and consequently the teachers may find themselves among the poorly evaluated: evaluators will not all be bias-free ... etcetera, etcetera. In addition to a potential loss of a job for lack of "excellence." educators are being asked to take wage freezes and/or cuts, to increase class sizes, to give up rights. Toni Salerno ... A Tribute to One of the First Members of PWRE July 9, 1924- November 5, 2010 There are only 4 things you need to know to understand who Antoinette Salerno was.

First, she had a deep and abiding faith in God which spread across everything else in her life. Second, she was all about everything to do with family. Third, she was a teacher and THE TEACHER that everyone wanted their children to have. Finally, she loved to travel



It's number 3 that I want to share more thoughts about and I'll start by saving the world is a better place because Antoinette Salerno was born on July 9, 1924. We spoke several

times about how the world has changed and how opportunities for women in the workplace have changed over the years. All who know her know that she would have been one of those women who would have been pushing against the "glass ceiling" if she had been born at a later time. It seemed that she was capable of doing anything that she decided she wanted to do. But, she was born in 1924 and the opportunities available to women

were much more limited than they are today. In the case of Antoinette Salerno this turned out to be a good

This was a good thing because she was an exceptional teacher. She loved all of her students and made sure that she gave each of them the part of her that they needed. But that was not enough for Toni. She was also constantly looking to the future to find ways to help her students cope with the world they would grow into. She was concerned with environmental education decades before the term "green" was adopted to signify a concern for the world in which we live. She worked with her students in the area of rapidly evolving technology and had computers in her classroom long before computers were part of every day life. She was not just content to teach children, she wanted to help prepare them to be viable parts of the world they would confront as

adults. To that end, she was never happier than when she received a letter from a former student telling her how much they respected what she had done for them. She had many students who have told her that she was a significant force in guiding their decisions about their life choices. Because of her love for the environment, she was particularly proud of the young man who gave her credit for pointing him on the career path of becoming a park ranger. She was proud of them all.

I started off by telling you the world was a better place because Aunt Toni was born on July 9, 1924. I'm going

More - We Asked to Hear from You ... and We Did! It Was a Dark and Stormy Night

By Merry Gilbert (And that was how our wonderful day out ended!)

The adventure began very early at Christopher Morley Park, where we met to board the bus for Hudson. New York, 18 miles south of Albany. We were headed to the homes and studios of Frederic Edwin Church and Thomas Cole (both now national historic sites), painters of what came to be called the Hudson River School.

Quoting from the "Art Trail" brochure: "In the early years of the 19th century, the fledgling American nation was seeking a cultural identity apart from Europe and a style of art that it could call its own. A group of artists found the answer in the beauty and

majesty of the natural world they encountered in the Hudson River Valley and created magnificent landscape paintings. This movement, the first in American art, became known as the Hudson River School. The Hudson River School painters believed art to be an agent of moral and spiritual transformation. In large-

scale canvases of dramatic vistas with atmospheric lighting, they sought to capture a sense of the divine, envisioning the pristine American landscape as a new Garden of Eden." Our first stop was Olana, home of Frederick Church, where we learned how Church

created an incredible house and studio, and transformed the property into an ornamental farm, including orchards, gardens, and a 10-acre lake he created. After a fabulous lunch at Reds, in Coxsaxie, we visited the home and studio of Thomas



Cole, Church's teacher, and original Hudson River school painter, "where American art was horn " In videos at both houses, we saw the actual landscape from which these artists painted, juxtaposed with their paintings. The Hudson River School Art Trail is a series of

actual walking paths you can follow to see the real scenes from which they painted Looking out of the window at the Cole House, we watched a storm boil its way up the Hudson. Our docent commented we might be in for some rain. And what a rain it was. Although macrobursts, tornadoes, and everything but locusts hit parts of New York City and Long Island, as we traveled home, we luckily missed all but a few showers. By the time we got



The RAC (Retiree Advisory Committee), chaired by NYSUT Vice-president Kathleen Donahue and Retiree Joan Perrini, is composed of 20-plus retiree members from around New York State, of which I am one. It meets quarterly, its most recent meeting having been earlier this month. We are charged with representing the interests of our retiree members and making these known to NYSUT, and - conversely - helping our retirees understand some of the problems being faced by NYSUT. In order to accomplish this agenda, we regularly attend meetings of retiree groups. NYSUT conventions, and in-service meetings in order to gather

information and report on RAC activities. For our three-year terms coming to its end in 2011, we have been working in focus groups on such topics as effective communication through the New York Teacher (now NYSUT United), the NYSUT website and Leader Access, as well as our own local publications and websites; engaging and increasing participation of our retirees; maximizing resources and revenue prospects. Our recommendations will go to the NYSUT Board, who will then act (or not) on some or all of our recommendations. Elaine

What's Happening with

On March 23, 2010. President Obama signed the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) the new health care law. The Act provides numerous benefits for seniors. Here are the major changes for Free Medical Check Up under Medicare Prior to passage of the new health care law, Medicare

allowed for a one-time free check up when seniors joined the Medicare program. Beginning in 2011, seniors will be able to get a free check up every year. Free Preventive Screenings Beneficiaries will no longer have to pay any cost-

sharing for Medicare-covered preventive services that are recommended by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force and rated A or B. The law also waives the Medicare deductible for colorectal cancer screening

Prescription Drug Discounts and Subsidies
In 2011, the Medicare Part D drug benefit donut hole
is from \$2840 to \$6447, 50. When beneficiaries fall into donut hole, they must pay the entire cost of their prescription medications. Beneficiaries would not exit the donut hole until they have paid a total of \$4550 in out-of-pocket costs. Beginning in 2011, Medicare beneficiaries who fall in the Part D drug benefit donut hole will receive a 50% discount on the price of their hole will also receive a 7 % government subsidy

Medicare Advantage Changes Medicare Advantage (MA) plans are prohibited from imposing higher cost-sharing requirements for some Medicare-covered benefits than is allowed under the traditional Medicare fee-for-service program. Also, Medicare will begin to phase-out overpayments to MA plans by freezing MA payments in 2011 at the 2010 level. MA plans are paid on average 14% more than traditional Medicare; thus the government pays these

toward the cost of generic drugs.

MyMedicare?

plans over \$1000 more per person each year than traditional Medicare. The overpayments also raise Part B premiums for seniors and the disabled, including those not on MA plans, by \$90 per couple a year. The new health care law restructures government payments to Medicare Advantage plans to keep them more in line with that of traditional Medicare. The reductions in overpayments will extend the solvency of the Medicare Trust Fund by 12 years according to the Medicare

Bonus for Primary Care Providers under Medicare Primary Care providers will receive a 10% bonus payment for primary care services under Medicare; also, general surgeons practicing in health professional shortage areas will receive a 10% Medicare bonus

payment Medicaid Long-Term Care Services Beginning October 1, 2011, the State Balancing Incentive Program in Medicaid will go into effect to provide enhanced federal matching payments to increase noninstitutionally based long-term care services.

Community First Choice Act On October 1, 2011, the Community First Choice Option in Medicaid will provide community-based attendant support services to people with disabilities who require institutional level of care. States will receive brand-name drugs. Beneficiaries who fall in the donut an enhanced federal match of 6 percent for reimbursable expenses
