# **Making Strides 2025 – Lisa Idol**

This year marks the 23<sup>rd</sup> year that NYSUT has partnered with The American Cancer Society. Since 2002, the American Cancer Society has been honored to have the New York State United Teachers as a New York State Flagship sponsor for Making Strides Against Breast Cancer. Making Strides Against Breast Cancer is the American Cancer Society's signature event to finish the fight against breast cancer. Each October, teams of walkers take to the streets to walk to end this disease. Funds raised support the American Cancer Society's mission against breast cancer through research, education, advocacy and services for patients. The efforts of the union and its members have generated support, energy, awareness, volunteers and more than \$12 million.

In 2024 NYSUT had 176 teams walk during 13 events across the state. In total, over \$300,000 was raised. As you know, this money saves lives and funds the future of cancer research.


I have written a book, using my pen name, to illustrate

# A Hoot for Help - Jim Jones

My name is Bubo virginianus, some of your species call me the great horned or 'hoot' owl. By any name, I share Long Island with you, and have done so for thousands of years. Now, I need your help. On the following day, I asked him about his early introduction to opera.

"The combination of music, visuals, and costumes appealed to me and it was fun!"

"I considered something that would offer easier time as a major which would have been a more legitimate choice. I considered musical theatre, but it meant having to dance."

Alex studied voice at Boston University and the Manhattan School of Music. And so....

# Lies About Social Security - Mary Anne Cariello

A number of lies are being told about Social Security in an effort to discredit it. One is that SS is just a Ponzi Scheme. The truth is that SS is an insurance program. Workers and employers pay in, money is put in the Social Security Trust Fund, and it is paid out when due. Social Security has a Board of Trustees and professional actuaries who report on the health of the Trust Fund every year. It is solvent and has never missed a payment in 89 years

Another lie is that there is a massive amount of fraud in Social Security. In 2024 Social Security's inspector general confirmed that fraud was not widespread, concluding that less than 1% of the payments that went out between 2015 and 2022 were improper. Social Security has several internal systems to find and reduce fraud.

A third lie is that Social Security makes up a majority of federal spending. Social security does not contribute to the deficit. It is a separate program from general federal spending. Its funding is from workers and employers, trust fund interest, and beneficiaries with high incomes.

A fourth lie deals with the fact that government databases list 4.7 million Social Security members from ages 100 to 109. However, fewer than 100,00 Americans over the age of 100 receive benefits. This is about the same number of people that the U.S. Census says that have reached that age. There are safeguards to ensure that deceased people do not continue to receive benefits. Funeral directors notify the SS Administration of deaths immediately, and the agency automatically stops payments for individuals 115 or older.

Another lie is that Democrats use Social Security to attract illegal immigrants and have them stay in the country. The truth is that undocumented immigrants are not allowed to collect Social Security benefits and cannot vote in elections. But many undocumented immigrants have Social Security taxes taken from their pay, so that in 2022, these deductions added about \$25 million to the Social Security Trust Fund.

Finally, Social Security has the funds to meet its obligations. Current trustees report that there is a 3.5% revenue shortfall over the next 25 years. The simple solution is to increase revenue over time by making the rich pay their fair share.

Don't be taken in by lies just because they are repeated over and over again. The truth is in the facts.
